May 8 Sarbmeet Kanwal, "Sikhism: A Faith for Our Times"

The May installment of our series on what Ethicalists can learn from other faith traditions



Sikhism is a relatively young religion (about 300 years old) founded in the midst of religious and political unrest that is not unlike some of the problems being

faced by the world today. This talk will cover the history, beliefs, practices and teachings of the Sikh religion. It will dwell on the relevance of Sikhism to some of our modern dilemmas. It will also mention some of the challenges faced by Sikhs in the U.S. today.

Sarbmeet Kanwal resides in Monmouth County in the town of Holmdel, NJ. He is an active board member of the Monmouth Center for World Religions and Ethical Thought where he leads a youth focused interfaith leadership program called Garden State MOSAIC (Mobilizing Our Students for Action to build Interfaith Community).

Sarbmeet retired a few years ago from a position as Director of Marketing at Bell Laboratories at Alcatel-Lucent (a global telecommunications company) and has since been teaching physics and astronomy at Brookdale Community College.

Sarbmeet received his MSc in physics from The Indian Institute of Technology in Kanpur, India, and a PhD in theoretical particle physics from Caltech, Pasadena, CA.

Local Heroes Project, Sunday, May 22

Widney Brown is our Local Hero Honoree for 2016 — To honor her leadership at Physicians for Human Rights; her support of our Essex Ethical Culture Society; and her efforts to spread good will and respect for gender differences in her neighborhood. She will be accepting the honor on Sunday,

May 22 in a brief presentation before the Solidarity Singers concert.

Widney Brown is the Director of Programs, New York, for Physicians for Human Rights. She oversees PHR's research, investigations, monitoring and evaluation, documentation, advocacy, and capacity-building projects. Prior to joining PHR, she served as the senior director for international law and policy at Amnesty International's Secretariat in London. She was responsible for Amnesty International's strategic litigation program, standard-setting initiatives, international justice program, advocacy in global and regional intergovernmental settings, and policy devel-

opment. Before Amnesty International, sheworked at Human Rights Watch for nine years during which time she served in a variety of roles, including as deputy program director, where she was responsible for overseeing the work of both re-

gional and thematic programs.

Locally, she has spoken for us at the Ethical Culture Society. She also has, in her own backyard in Maplewood, quietly supported

SOCIAL ACTION NOTES

A delivery has been made of detergent, cleaning supplies, oil and olive oil for Syrian refugee families in Elizabeth. Everyone is reminded to bring more of these supplies to the society.

We bought a \$25 ad for the NJ Peace Action journal, as we have been empowered to do by the Board, with the thought that we will both support

organizations who share our values and get some visibility for our Society. The group then voted to take a \$25 donor ad for the journal of the First Friends of New Jersey and New York, the support group for immigrant detainees in New Jersey, with whom we've been working for several years.

We have also made phone calls to NJ Assemblywoman Holly Schepisi, Republican of Westwood, Bergen County. Ms. Schepisi is a new member of the Assembly appropriations committee, and she supported the bill to lower phone rates for all incarcerated persons earlier this year. This bill passed both the NJ Assembly and the NJ Senate in February only to get a pocket veto from Governor Christie. We were asked to call Ms. Schepisi and thank her for her previous support and ask her to support A1419 again.

Finally, we discussed our Local Heroes Project: Widney Brown is our honoree for 2016, and we agreed to have the event on May 22, 2016 (see item for May 22 program). — *MSW*
