Leader's Message Dear Members and Friends,

When Mr. Kay, the U.S. Inspector for the search of Weapons of Mass Destruction (WMD) in Iraq, made his dramatic revelation that it is now clear to him that there were no WMD in Iraq at the time we decided



no WMD in Iraq at the time we decided to go to war, there were doubtless many informed Americans who simply said "Ho Hum, hardly a revelation." While as it is admittedly difficult to say with absolute certainty that there were in fact none whatsoever, it was very easy to say that there was insufficient evidence to

make the claim with a high level of confidence. (It was insufficient to convince the UN Security Council whose members could not be immune from the fear of being attacked by nuclear weapons.) Then using this as the justification for war is even further questionable. We had no doubt about Pearl Harbor. We do not convict criminal defendants on anything less than the standard of "beyond reasonable doubt." Yet we have gone to war and taken thousands of lives on evidence that does not even approach the criminal standard.

Then why did we not wait for the evidence to come in through further inspections? Why the rush? Could it involve the aim to complete the war before the next election? Wars based on questionable motives that drag on have a negative effect on re-electability.

Given the recent revelations of Mr. Kay, however, the issue before us at this time, however, is the question of the culpability of the Chief Executive for having lead us into a war based on false justifications.

The response given by the President in blaming the Intelligence agencies for the lack of solid intelligence is a

bit like the child who says my younger brother told me to do it when caught by a parent. Consider the President's response to the furor raised by the revelation of the falsity of the claim about Iraq having attempted to purchase high grade uranium from Nigeria made by him in his State of the Union Address. He simply blamed the CIA whose Director obediently took the fall for his boss by taking responsibility despite the fact that the record showed that the CIA had warned him that the claim could not be verified. In a similar vein, the New York Times editorial on February 1 sites an initial supporter of the war (a previous National Security official) who, prior to the onset of the war, had learned from CIA officials about their complaints of unusually challenging responses and negative reactions to information contradicting the existence of WMD in Iraq by high level government officials. Furthermore the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace noted a vast change in the tone of CIA reports which were previously presented with "cautious qualifications and caveat," as opposed to the "more alarmist" tone of the current administration.

The CIA was not always so co-opted. After the Afghanistan war when Bush started talking about Iraq being a haven for Al Qaida, the CIA's director contradicted his claim. He became remarkably less vocal thereafter.

If Bush was committed to going to war regardless of the facts regarding WMD, what then was his motive? While there may be several, I would opt for one: oil resources, a power base in the middle east at a time when the oil resources in surrounding countries are in danger of becoming unavailable to us because of their increased vulnerability to popular or extremist revolt.


