Jan. 12 Anisa Mehdi, "Walking the Middle East"

The simple act of walking is an age-old method for people from around the world to connect with one another. Since 2007, the Abraham Path Initiative (API) has seeded walk-

ing trails in the part of Southwest Asia we call "the Middle East" to introduce people to an ancient land and its hospitable residents. For API, walking is a tool to deepen understanding, experience cultures, and foster friendships across challenging divides. API shines a light on the ages-old traditions of hospitality in the region, emphasizing how people welcome strangers in honor of Abraham/Ibrahim, the spiritual ancestor of over half of humanity. API Executive Director Anisa Mehdi will share stories and life lessons from walking and meeting people along trails in the Sinai, Jordan, and most recently, the Kurdish region of northern Iraq.

A lifetime of interest in and concern for the Middle East is at the foundation of Anisa Mehdi's passion

for Abraham Path Initiative. An Iraqi-American of mixed religious heritage, Anisa deeply appreciates the variety and nuance of regional cultures and tensions. For more than 20 years



she was a broadcast journalist, winning two Emmys, a CINE Golden Eagle, and numerous prizes from the Society of Professional Journalists for her work in religion and the arts. Anisa is an alumna of Wellesley College and the Graduate School of Journalism at Columbia University. She lived in Jordan as a Fulbright Scholar, mentoring professional broadcasters and teaching aspiring filmmakers. She affirms the experience of walking as an effective way to create stronger links between people at this vital time for our world.

Jan 19 Michael Lally, "Poetry and Prejudice"

Returning to Essex Ethical, much-published local poet, actor and author Mike Lally will be reading from recent works and sharing his very personal view of how the South Orange/Maplewood community has evolved from the 1940s to today.

Born in Orange NJ, 1942, youngest of seven in an Irish-American clan of priests, politicians, and cops; Michael Lally began Civil Rights activism



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and reading poetry in bars and coffee houses in 1959; in the military from 1962-66; in 1968 ran for sheriff of Johnson County, Iowa, on The Peace & Freedom Party ticket while at the U. of Iowa's Writers Workshop on the G.I. Bill. Feminist and LGBQT+ activist since 1969. 30 books since 1970 including the latest, *Another Way To Play: Poems 1960-2017* (Seven Stories Press 2018).

Next meeting scheduled for Jan 12

We are collecting clean coats through the end of February to be distributed through Valley Settlement House in West Orange, and other clothes to be distributed by the Eglise Baptiste Nouvelle Jerusalem in Irvington (706 Nye Ave.).

The Committee agreed to endorse a broadly supported (already signed by multiple religious and peace groups and others) statement of principles on International Sanctuary (see below). This was sent to us by AEU executive director Bart Worden.

AEU Signs International Sanctuary Principles Statement

The American Ethical Union and several of our Ethical Societies signed the below statement on principles of sanctuary that can be used to guide grassroots and governmental response to the global escalation of displacement. It is in conformity and solidarity with the United Nations Convention Relating to the Status of Refugees of 1951, a multilateral treaty that defines who is a refugee, and sets out the rights of individuals who are granted asylum and the responsibilities of nations that grant asylum. We express our deep concern for the well-being of the refugee children, families and all migrants currently arriving at our borders, as well as those struggling to live within our borders. In response to the increased numbers of people around the world who are being forced to leave their home countries, and the simultaneous increase in punitive enforcement in many receiving countries, we affirm the following principles to guide and inspire our efforts to respond:

- Compassionate Response: We care deeply about refugee children, families and all migrants, and we urge our countries to have open arms to protect them and preserve their human dignity. We reject detention of migrants as a violation of human rights and dignity.
- Due Process: We advocate for fair and timely legal proceedings, competent legal representation, and due process for children, asylum seekers, and all migrants.
- Family Unity: We uphold and respect the unity of families as a basic human right.
- Restorative Justice: We desire revitalization and healing of our borderlands, not militarization. The only long-term solution is a holistic approach that prioritizes safety and opportunity for migrants and addresses root causes.
- Civil Initiative: As long as our governments are not adequately addressing these humanitarian crises, citizens have the right and responsibility to respond with an approach that follows the man-

date to provide sanctuary when needed and, above all, to love our neighbors.

Based on these principles, we covenant with one another to work together for just and humane response to all migrants both at our borders and within our countries. We call on our governments, and the governments of all countries receiving migrants in response to the current and ongoing international humanitarian and refugee crisis to embrace these principles.
