And as the founder of the arts-based urban renewal movement called ValleyArts, which redefined the former hat factory area of Orange, NJ, as an arts destination, stimulated the local economy, activated community development, beautified blighted streets and provided after school programs for underserved youth.

Cate Lazen is an Educational Psychologist, School Social Worker and Clinician who partners with individuals, children and families who are dealing with academic, behavioral, developmental, social or emotional challenges at home or at school; divorce or marital/family conflict; trauma, crises, grief or loss.

(Co-Chair, Ethical Action Committee, American Ethical Union). The Susquehanna Valley Ethical Society wants to be a signatory, stating, "Our membership stands in unity for the humane treatment of our immigrant brothers and sisters and for asylum seekers worldwide." Also, the Austin society is working on it, following their democratic process. They will discuss it 4/13 and if passed present it at their 4/21 membership meeting.

We also had an exchange with SOMA Justice, who said, "We would be able to have SOMA Action as a co-signer on this letter, but contingent on one suggested edit, if ok with you. We have been very careful not to use statements such as, 'the United States is a nation of immigrants.' This is because we believe that statements like these don't acknowledge all the peoples who have built this nation, specifically indigenous people and enslaved persons. Would it be possible to leave that sentence out of this letter?"

The Committee decided to take out the sentence: "As has been said many times before, the United States is a nation of immigrants." Sue will send the new version to SOMA Justice, the AEU Listsery, Susquehanna, and etc.

Finally we decided to send version of the letter to The

New York Times in light of the April 7 article about murders of women in Honduras.
