Nov. 10 Bart Worden, "Ethical Humanism: Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow"

The first Ethical Society was founded over 140 years ago which may be a long time compared to our per-



sonal lives but is a blink of the eye for the larger historical context. Our movement has waxed and waned and has continued to have somewhere in the

order of 2000 members nationwide for the past 30 years. Meanwhile, the landscape for humanism in the United States has changed dramatically in the past two decades. How will the Ethical Culture Movement best relate to this new reality where there are many other humanist groups who often share some but not all of the Ethical Movement's values and interests?

Bart Worden has been the Executive Director of the American Ethical Union, the national federation of Ethical Culture and Ethical Humanist Societies, since 2012. Bart is, in addition, the clergy leader for the Ethical Culture Society of Westchester, and is a Social Worker who has worked with programs that help people recover from psychiatric disability.

Nov. 17 Donna Baier Stein, "Turning Images into Tales: Writing Ekphrastic Fiction & Poetry" (postponed from Sept.)

Award-winning author Donna Baier Stein discusses the role of visual art in literature and her use of lithographs by famed painter Thomas Hart Benton in the creation of her latest book, *Scenes from the Heartland*.

Benton was one of the most popular modern artists and arguably the best Regionalist painter of the 20th

century. He was the first American artist to appear on the cover of Time magazine and his art illustrated the cover of John Steinbeck's *Grapes of*



Wrath. He gained artistic fame portraying the people and culture of the American Midwest, particularly in his home state of Missouri. Through his art, he made bold statements about politics, society, and culture and he broadened both the scope of what was considered artistic subject matter and who might appreciate it. His portrayal of ordinary Americans — steelworkers, dance hall girls, preachers, farmers, and more - provided rich inspiration for Baier Stein's stories. Her new collection, consisting of nine tales inspired by the lithographs of Benton, bring to vivid life the early decades of the 20th century. While his lithographs depict the past, the real-life people he portrayed face issues that are front and center today: corruption, women's rights, racial inequality.

In addition to *Scenes from the Heartland*, Donna is the author of *The Silver Baron's Wife, Sympathetic People, Sometimes You Sense the Difference*, and *Letting Rain Have Its Say* and her writing has appeared in numerous journals and anthologies. [donnabaierstein.com]

Jim was born and raised on a farm in Virginia. He attended Harvard, earned a master's at Teacher's College in New York and spent five years teaching emotionally disturbed children in Manhattan and the Bronx before studying law at New York Law School. As a lawyer, Jim espoused social justice and civil liberties. He started a mental health practice in Manhattan that handles cases for psychiatric patients. In 1989, he was certified as an Ethical Leader, and he led the Ethical Culture Society of Essex County in New Jersey for eight years (now Leader Emeritus at the Society) before going to the Bronx Riverdale Society in 2010 as Leader, now retired. Currently, in addition to co-chairing the Congregations for Justice in Harlem, Jim is co-founder of Bronx Climate Justice North. — Jeanine Rosh

where people can come together, listen to the music, take a break, refuel and be inspired. The Preludes and Fugues are particularly appropriate, because the contrapuntal style of Bach's compositions represents in music what we encounter in life: a network where everything hangs together. What happens in one voice has an impact on the entire system of independent, but not self-sufficient voices that share responsibilities in a common task.

The monthly sessions are Fridays at 7–8 pm (see calendar for schedule).

The series culminates with a complete performance on Friday 9/11/20 at 7:30 pm. Suggested donations: \$10 per session; final concert \$25. Admission for students is free. Proceeds to benefit the Ethical Culture Society and Interfaith Hospitality Network of Essex County.

TO BE HOPEFUL in bad times is not just foolishly romantic. It is based on the fact that human history is a history not only of cruelty, but also of compassion, sacrifice, courage, kindness.

Born in Brooklyn, New York, Howard Zinn was a historian, playwright, and social activist. He was a shipyard worker and a bombardier with the U.S. Army Air Force in Europe during the Second World War before he went to college under the GI Bill and received his Ph.D. from Columbia University.

Zinn taught at Spelman College and Boston University, and was a visiting professor at the University of Paris and the University of Bologna. He received the Thomas Merton Award, the Eugene V. Debs Award, the Upton Sinclair Award, and the Lannan Literary Award. He lived in Auburndale, Massachusetts. [http://howardzinn.org]
